
CLASSY KO SAMUI





WHERE TO STAY

See Daeng (140 Moo 1, Maenam Beach; 00 66 81 537 0302; info@seedaengsamui. com). With polished-wood interiors, sundecks and elephant frescoes on walls, these tiny weatherboard cottages are as simple as it gets, yet classy for the cash. Unbeatable beach location, too. Doubles from £8, room only.

Sand Sea Resort and Spa (155 Moo 4, North Lamai; 00 66 77 231127, www.samuisandsea. com). With unfussy sea-view chalets on the beach, a small, shaded pool and a bijou bar serving cocktails, this mini-resort is a taste of old backpacker Ko Samui – albeit upgraded. Doubles from £32, B&B.

Tamarind Springs (205/7 Thong Takian; 00 66 77 424221, www.tamarindsprings.com). Set in a steep, shady garden and built around granite boulders and rainforest trees, these Zen-meets-Frank Lloyd Wright serviced villas (all with kitchens) will hit the spot if you're looking for a real home from home. Doubles from £99, B&B.

Poppies (Chaweng; 00 66 77
422419, www.poppiessamui.com).
For a beachside-boutique retreat from chaotic
Chaweng, step inside one of these plush,
peaceful wooden chalets, all with Thai dragon
roofs and open-air bathrooms. There's
relaxation away from the beach, too, in
orchid-filled gardens threaded with a burbling
stream. Doubles from £111, room only.

W Retreat (Maenam; 00 66 77 915999, www. starwoodhotels.com). Gloriously garish rooms are decorated with sparkly scatter cushions, glaring colour schemes and softly-glowing plunge pools. Add fashionable eating, a neon-lit infinity pool bar, an after-hours beach lounge and you have the sort of hotel to arrive at single, and depart attached. Doubles from £342, B&B.

Conrad Koh Samui (Hillcrest Rd., Tambon Taling-Ngam; 00 66 77 915888, www.conradhotels.com). Clinging to lush forest-covered slopes, each villa at this glamorous recent arrival has a roomy plunge pool. Wallow in front of swoon-inducing views over a bay of islands – and you'll be convinced these are the most romantic rooms in Samui, if not Southeast Asia.

Doubles from £342, room only.

WHERE TO EAT

Mitra Samui Restaurant (Moo 2, Chaweng Yai Soi 2). With its strip-lights and plastic tables, it doesn't look much. But the seafood is 10 times better than elsewhere, at a 10th of the price. Plates of crustaceans are plonked down before ravenous diners, locals slurp house speciality Hoi Lai Paht Prik Phao (chilli and basil-fried clams). Dishes around £2.

Coco Tam's (99/1 Moo 1, Bophut; 00 66 81 712333). Chefs from the resorts eat at this laid-back kitchen. The seafood is catch of the day, the spices and veg are fresh from Bophut market and the cooking is elegant Thai.

Come at dusk for a beer on the beachside scatter cushions. Mains around £5.

Sa Bieng Lae (438/82 Moo 1, Maret, near Lamai; 00 66 77 233083). You'll see as many locals as tourists eating the southern Thai curries and seafood at this nicely hectic, open-sided haunt on the beach near Lamai. Mains around £7.

Lan Tania (Four Seasons Samui, 219
Moo 5, Ang Thong; 00 66 77 243000, www.
fourseasons.com). Fancy a break from
Asian? Enter this chain hotel's flagship kitchen,
a breezy outpost in delicate teak. Dine openair with an ocean view and the chance to get
your chops around Italian – seafood linguine,
say – or roast lamb. Mains around £17.

Jahn (Conrad Koh Samui – see Where to Stay). This is the honeymoon table of choice on the island, where lovers cosy up against a fiery sunset. Impressive Thai and Asian cooking is by ex-Quaglino's chef Joe Diaz – most memorable is the Wagyu beef massaman. Mains around £20.

Dining on the Rocks (Six Senses Samui, 9/10 Moo 5, Baan Plai Laem, Bophut; 00 66 77 245671, www.sixsenses.com). This medal-winning restaurant pioneered Samui's journey into super-modern gastronomy. Dishes are ostentatious reconstructions of classic Thai recipes. Tangy Tom Yam soup is retextured as foam, and served with ginger scallops and parmesan crackers. Set menu £98.

Now more boutique than beatnik, the Thai party isle's added high-end spas, food – and sexy hotels




But old shacks are now boutique hotels, and chic spas and restaurants have arrived—making Samui Southeast Asia's smartest resort.

WHAT TO SEE & DO

- For posing, don a sarong and strut along cheeky Chaweng: a long half-moon of coral sand, it's all beach burns by day. Miamistyle hedonism by night. Take things down a notch and nip round its southern cove for a sunlounger at Samui Yacht Club (00 66 77 448 4867, www.samuiyachtclub.com). on the island's crowd-free secret bay, Thong Takan
- O Spas are as common as ladyboys on Samu-- and the choice can be overwhelming. Postflight, try a Steam and Dream in the rainforest at Tamarind Springs (Thong Takian: 00 66 77 424221, www.tamarindsprings.com; from E30 Mineral-water plunge-pools are filled by a mountain stream, and the steam room is built into a boulder covered with ferns and orchids.
- Golden, 12m tall and in a state of constant contemplative calm, Buddha watches over







Samui from a temple on a promontory at Big Buddha Beach. Claim a cushion at Rubik's cube-shaped bar The Pier (www.thepier-samui. com), order a Mai Tai and survey the holy site, with a backdrop of bobbing fishing boats and the distant indigo mountains of Ko Phangan.

- Explore the untouched islets of the Ang Thong Marine Park archipelago, just west of Samui. Spread like jewels on blue cloth, they're trimmed with rice-white beaches and halos of kaleidoscopic coral. The highlight is the vivid green lake on Ko Mae Ko, so protected you're not allowed to swim here. Grand Sea Tours (00 66 77 427001, www.grandseatours. com) runs day trips from £42pp.
- Dive with fish as big as buses. Every March-April and August-October, seven-metre-long whale sharks sweep in from the Indian Ocean to feed on plankton around the submerged

mountain peak Chumphon Pinnacle. It's off the dive site of Ko Tao, an island still in a state of backpacker infancy. Keep it classy and commute from Ko Samui with Coral Grand Divers (00 66 77 430531, www.samui.coral granddivers.com); day trips from £92pp.

- Explore Samui the glam-romantic way: on a boho-chic motor scooter, with the breeze in your hair (00 66 77 256060, www.location automotosamui.com; from £3 a day). A web of little roads covers the mountainous interior; every turn brings a view over tropical hills to the shimmering Gulf of Thailand. Side roads uncover waterfalls, including Na Muang, where you can cool off in the rocky pool and get a vigorous massage from the falling water.
- Marvel at the statue of Guanyin, the manyarmed goddess of mercy and compassion, at Wat Plai Laem. She's said to protect sailors

and ensure healthy births; you'll see fishermen and couples making offerings at her feet, or casting corn to the fat fish that idle in her lake. Zazen (00 66 77 425085, www.samuizazen. com), on nearby Bophut Beach, overlooks the statue and is the spot for a cosy supper on the sand. Reserve the private pavilion on the beach in advance.

Sunday-brunch pool parties are the latest trend. DJs spin house music to a Champagne-and oyster-guzzling crowd at Beach Republic (Lamai Beach; www.beachrepublic.com; 11.30am-sunset), where the private cabanas are the most prized on the island. Or hop over to the quieter west coast at swanky Nikki Beach (Lipa Noi; www.nikkibeach.com; 11am-sunset): a slice of St Tropez in Southeast Asia.

Q Bar Samui (147/57 Moo 2, Bophut; www.qbarsamui.com). The mood-lit sister bar to Bangkok's (in)famous Sukhumvit joint is hot for sunset cocktails – served on a terrace with superb sea views. As the night descends, the music shifts gear, with DJs playing Euro beats.

Ark Bar (159/89, Moo 2, Chaweng Beach). The king of Ko Samui's beach parties: bronzed young things dance on neon-lantern-lit tables and flirt over the ubiquitous bucket of Thai whisky and Red Bull.

Green Mango (9/34 Chaweng Beach Rd, Bophut; www.thegreenmangoclub.com), With a warehouse-walled, open-sided dance area, numerous little bars and pounding techno, this is where Samui parties hardest.

WHERE TO SHOP
Bophut Fisherman's Market (Bophut).
With sizzling woks and street stalls selling anything from tiger prawns to T-shirts, this beachside bazaar makes for great browsing.

Chaweng Strip (Chaweng). Even the most shopping-averse will be seduced by something on this long street of boutiques and street stalls flogging all sorts: tailor-made suits,

Birkenstocks, cheap sunnies and satay...


Ask the local

'Airport taxi drivers charge 10 times the usual rate for even the shortest trip. Request a pick-up through your hotel in advance, or catch the regular minibus shuttle from outside the terminal to

Lamai or Chaweng, where taxis are cheaper.
Choose your base carefully: revellers mass in the east, on Lamai and Chaweng beaches. For privacy, tranquillity and glimpses of old
Thailand, stay west. The island is small enough for everything to be reachable in less than an hour on a scooter. Ko Samui is massage central, but visitors can be stung by hotel spa prices, so try the numerous outfits behind Chaweng or Lamai beaches. Choose one where the masseuses are uniformed and they'll be resort-quality. A Thai massage, based on ayurvedic techniques, will cost less than £5.'
